2nd Annual Jazz Audition a Huge Success!!

The SKSCA held its second annual Seattle-Kobe Female Jazz Vocalist Audition at Seattle's premier jazz club, Dimitriou's Jazz Alley, on March 27, 2006. This year's event was an overwhelming success, with excellent vocalists participating and over 325 appreciative audience members.

The winners were chosen after inspired performances by the three high school semi-finalists and six adult semifinalists, and intense deliberation by the judges.

In the adult division, first place went to Gail Pettis,

one of the top performers in the local Seattle jazz scene and the adult special mention from our audition last year. Gail gave a flaw-less, romantic rendition of Jimmy van Heusen's "I Thought About You." Special Mention went to Valerie Joyce, whose debut CD "New York Blue" was released this year. With

her unique vocal style she gave a touching interpretation of Miles Davis' classic composition "Blue in Green."

First place in the high school division went to Bellingham High School senior, **Courtney Fortune**. With her low, sultry voice, Courtney captivated the listeners with her rendition of Bart Howard's "Fly Me to the Moon." **Courtney Cutchins**, Mount Si High School senior, captured the high school division special mention award with her interpretation of Thelonious Monk's "Round' Midnight." 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2006 Japan-America Society Annual Meeting Honors Former Mayor Gordon Clinton and Griffith Way

The Japan-America Society's 2006 Annual Meeting on March 22, 2006, at Bell Harbor International Conference Center featured the **Honorable Thomas S. Foley**, former Ambassador to Japan and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, as the keynote speaker.

JASŚW also proudly announced the first annual Thomas S. Foley Award. The award was designed to recognize persons or companies who have contributed to building the foundation of the strong relationship between the state of Washington and the people of Japan. The four individuals who were honored for their contributions are:

- Mr. Gordon Clinton: A former mayor of Seattle who was instrumental in establishing the Seattle-Kobe Sister City relationship 49 years ago.
- **Ms. Eleanor Hadley**: An economist who served with General MacArthur's staff in Tokyo after World War II to bridge the two countries.
- Mr. Edward Tsutakawa: A civic visionary who bridged Washington State and Japan by providing academic support, including the establishment of the Mukogawa Ft. Wright Institute (the U.S. campus for Mukogawa Women's University).
- Mr. Griffith Way: An attorney who was instrumental in resuming trade between Washington State and Japan after World War II by assisting Japan with trade shows in the U.S. in the 40's to 50's.
